

A Comparative Study of Tribal Folklore and Mainstream Assamese Literature

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Abstract- This study explores the dynamic relationship between tribal folklore and mainstream Assamese literature through a comparative literary and cultural perspective. Assam is recognised for its multilingual and multicultural social fabric, where tribal communities have preserved rich oral traditions in the form of folk narratives, myths, legends, songs, rituals, and performance practices. These traditions carry collective memory, indigenous knowledge, ecological consciousness, social values, and community identity. Mainstream Assamese literature, on the other hand, has evolved through written literary traditions while continuously interacting with regional cultural expressions. The present study examines points of convergence and divergence between these two literary streams with special attention to themes, narrative patterns, symbolic structures, language use, representation of nature, and socio-cultural values. The paper also analyses how tribal folklore has contributed to enriching Assamese literary imagination and how literary incorporation influences the visibility and preservation of indigenous traditions. Adopting a qualitative and comparative approach based on textual and contextual analysis, the study highlights that tribal folklore is not peripheral to Assamese literary development but constitutes an important cultural foundation that broadens literary discourse and promotes inclusive cultural understanding. The findings suggest that recognising indigenous oral traditions within academic and literary spaces strengthens cultural continuity, encourages interdisciplinary scholarship, and supports the preservation of Assam's diverse heritage in contemporary times.

Oral traditions of tribal communities continue to function not only as artistic forms but also as repositories of historical experience and indigenous knowledge.

Mainstream Assamese literature has evolved through written forms such as poetry, fiction, drama, essays, and criticism. However, the literary landscape of Assam cannot be understood in isolation from the influence of oral cultural traditions. Tribal folklore contributes themes, symbols, ecological consciousness, moral values, and alternative worldviews that enrich literary production and widen interpretative possibilities.

The present study adopts a comparative perspective to examine relationships, intersections, and distinctions between tribal folklore and mainstream Assamese literature. Comparative literary inquiry enables deeper understanding of cultural exchange, representation, continuity, and transformation within regional literary traditions.

1.1 Background of the Study

Tribal communities of Assam have maintained diverse forms of oral expression including folktales, songs, myths, legends, proverbs, ceremonial performances, and narratives connected with everyday life. Although several studies discuss Assamese literature and folklore independently, comparative academic exploration between tribal folklore and mainstream Assamese literary traditions remains limited. This study contributes to understanding literary inclusiveness, indigenous representation, cultural preservation, and interdisciplinary literary research.

The comparison focuses on themes, narrative techniques, symbolism, language use, and character representation, relationship with nature, moral structures, and cultural identity. The study also explores processes of adaptation and reinterpretation across oral and written traditions.

Existing discussions frequently treat tribal folklore as supplementary to literary development rather than as a foundational cultural resource. The present study addresses this gap by examining tribal folklore as an active contributor to Assamese literary imagination.

Limited attention has been given to narrative comparison, thematic intersections, symbolic structures, and the role of tribal traditions in shaping literary imagination.

2.9 Relevance of the Present Study

The present study addresses this gap by adopting a comparative and interpretive approach to understand how tribal folklore contributes to mainstream Assamese literary expression. It attempts to establish tribal oral traditions as an integral cultural resource that expands literary understanding and supports inclusive scholarship.

III. METHODOLOGY OF THE STUDY

The discussion was developed through textual comparison, thematic coding, contextual interpretation, and synthesis of literary evidence.

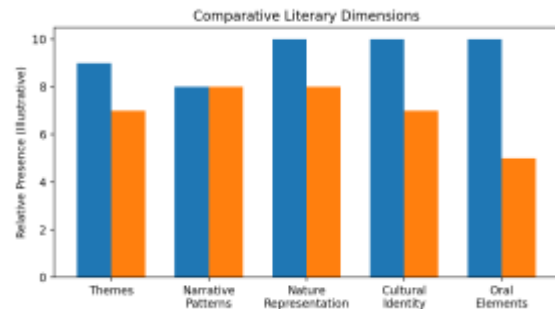
4.5 Interpretation of Findings

CONCLUSION

The present study examined the relationship between tribal folklore and mainstream Assamese literature through a comparative literary perspective. The analysis demonstrated that these traditions are interconnected cultural domains that together contribute to the broader literary identity of Assam. Tribal folklore, preserved through oral transmission, carries collective memory, indigenous knowledge, symbolic meaning, and social values, while mainstream Assamese literature reflects processes of textual expansion, literary transformation, and cultural interpretation.

A comparative reading of themes, narrative structures, representation of nature, language practices, and identity formation indicates that tribal folklore has contributed significantly to shaping literary imagination within Assamese literary traditions. Similarities emerged in the areas of ethical values, community orientation, and cultural continuity, whereas differences appeared mainly in modes of transmission, textual organisation, and forms of literary expression.

The study further observed that tribal oral traditions should not be interpreted as peripheral cultural expressions but as meaningful literary resources that enrich regional literature. The findings suggest that recognition and preservation of indigenous narratives can strengthen inclusive literary scholarship and encourage broader academic engagement with local knowledge systems.

In relation to the objectives of the study, the investigation established conceptual understanding of tribal folklore, examined characteristics of mainstream Assamese literature, identified comparative literary dimensions, highlighted contributions of indigenous traditions, and emphasised the educational and cultural relevance of preserving oral heritage.

Overall, the study concludes that a balanced engagement between oral and written traditions offers greater possibilities for literary understanding, cultural preservation, and interdisciplinary research in contemporary contexts.

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
