The collected data is analysed using simple statistical tools such as tables, percentages, and charts. This helps in presenting the findings in a clear and understandable manner.

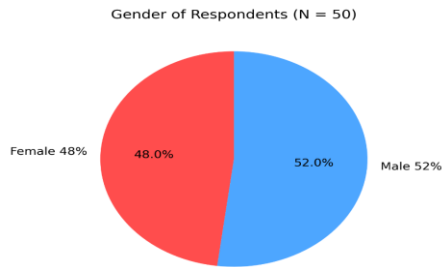
- **Limitations of the Study:**

Gender of Respondents

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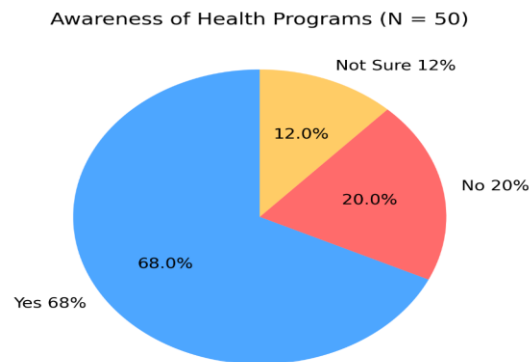


Data Interpretation
