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Abstract- Gadchiroli district of Maharashtra is one of India's most forest-rich and tribal-dominated regions. Traditionally dependent on agriculture, minor forest produce, and forest-based livelihoods, the district has recently witnessed rapid industrialization due to mining, steel manufacturing, infrastructure development, and government investment initiatives.
